# Letter from The Minister, Rev Kenny Stott

## Easter 2026

Dear Friends,

The old saying that a week is a long time in politics continues to be true. As I write this letter we are into the 10<sup>th</sup> day of the war that has led to such destruction in Iran, Israel, Lebanon and many of the Gulf States. Will it be over soon? What might happen next?

The news is bleak and perhaps many seek to escape the horrors by focusing on new flowers, Easter bunnies and blue skies and while we all need distractions, we also want something real to hold onto in a period of turmoil.

The Easter story as revealed in the Bible is full of incidents where we want to turn our eyes and close our ears – betrayal, greed, violence, death, these are always destructive and distressing. Yet if Jesus is the Son of God, then God was and is amid the violence and pain.

Jesus said and did things that upset the religious and political classes of the time, He refused to back down or go away and so the only course of action left for those who felt threatened was to remove Him and to kill Him. The hope was that Jesus' death would end His campaign and demoralise His followers. A plan was hatched where Jesus would be killed – the religious leaders and the Roman authorities will combine; their power will crush this Jesus movement!

What was so dangerous and offensive about what Jesus said?

Jesus challenged the use of power and wealth.

Jesus challenged the notion that God was only interested in Israel.

Jesus claimed to be the Messiah and that all people needed salvation and forgiveness.

All Jesus' words upset the proud and self-righteous!

We know that after a sham trial Jesus is condemned to death and He is crucified – a public execution that was not only violent but designed to cause fear amongst sympathisers. Jesus is buried in a tomb, and it

appears that the world goes back to the way it has always been – the powerful and the rich rule!

If a week is long in politics, three days can change eternity!

Three days after the crucifixion, Jesus was raised from death, and he will greet and meet His followers. Death and power are not the final words because He lives – the tomb is empty! Jesus will return to Heaven, but He gives his followers at least two things that will see His kingdom emerge – the promise of the Holy Spirit who will give people power to love and serve; and a message of life changing power.

The Easter story is a message that offers hope to individuals for it says that because Jesus died and rose again we can know forgiveness and be reconnected to the living God – it is personal.

It is also a message for the world that there is a better way; our hope is rooted in an empty tomb and the man who connects both.

Sometimes it feels as if darkness wins.

There is the well-known story that after ‘The Battle of Waterloo’, a series of messages were sent using some form of flags from the battlefield back to Britain. From one hilltop to the next the message was being passed along. However, in the course of the messages being sent a fog descended and people only saw half the message – “Wellington defeated”. There was great sadness and fear, but when the clouds lifted the whole sentence was seen and everything changed – “Wellington defeated Napoleon”.

The body being placed in the tomb is not the final word.

May we all know the power and hope of the living Christ this Easter and in all that lies before us.

## **Union of Two Churches**

At the Presbytery of Perth meeting on Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> February 2026, the presbytery plan was approved and that meant that Perth North and St. Leonard's in the Fields were encouraged to enter a union. In December 2025 we had a social evening for both Kirk Sessions as it was felt that it was important to begin to get to know each other and to hear each other's hopes and concerns. There will now be more formal meetings between the Kirk Sessions as the process of union gathers speed.

As we have said on several occasions we will keep the congregation as informed as we can as to the process and the potential changes. Nothing happens without a congregational vote.

At the same Presbytery meeting, the appointment of Gayle Lennon was intimated, and she will serve as the Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Officer. Gayle has kindly agreed to chair a joint meeting of the Kirk Sessions on the 7<sup>th</sup> of April where we will hear more of the key stages involved in any union discussions.

Can I ask you please to pray for our meetings and for all who are anxious about the potential changes. Pray that we can recognise the strengths in each other's congregations and that together we would work for the kingdom of God.

With the potential union there will be new things – for example our church magazine will change as we combine two styles and formats.

This maybe the last edition of Perth North News and so I would thank all who over the years have been involved in the editing, printing and distribution of the magazine. The Kirk Session received intimation last year from Carol Kynaston that she would stand down as the Editor after the Easter edition this year and so we would want to thank Carol for the years of service in editing, compiling and providing us with a magazine that informs and challenges. Thank you Carol.

With change comes opportunities and challenges but we worship the living God who has led His people through new and exciting times, so let's look forward in hope.

## TASH

I am pleased to say that **TASH** (Tayside & Strathearn Help for Ukraine) has been very busy since my last report and managed to send 2500 Christmas Boxes out to Ukraine for children aged 3-16 yrs old. This was a huge increase this year Christmas 2025 on the 1000 Christmas boxes sent in 2024 and 700 boxes in 2023. This is all thanks to the generosity of businesses and the public who helped make this all possible. Thank you!

This was such a success that we have now embarked on a new venture of Senior or Elderly boxes for the older people of Ukraine, and these are being filled with tea, coffee, soap, shampoo, toiletries etc.. Our first 500 boxes left in the middle of March for Ukraine. We are continuing to make them up along with our usual lorry loads of medicine, medical equipment, winter clothes, food, candles and torches etc..

Lorry 119 has now left Errol for Ukraine, and this is a great achievement for such a small group based in Errol but again this just shows the generosity of the businesses and people of Scotland. Our van continues to travel to Aberdeen, Inverness, Ayr and Edinburgh collecting donations to be brought to our warehouse to be sorted, boxed, weighed and put on pallets.

After our Christmas break, the donations had piled up, and we suddenly had four lorry loads (over 100) pallets and only enough money for two lorries. Our appeal on STV on the 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2026 brought in enough funds to pay for all the lorries and so we continue the good work. Ukraine is not so prominent in the news right now because of the conflict in Iran. However, the war in Ukraine continues with their Energy Power System blown to bits. The request is now for candles, torches and polythene sheeting to cover the blown in windows.

Thank you to all the people of the North Church for your continued help and support. It is very much appreciated.

### Thanks to the Editor

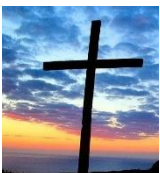
As some of you may know, Carol Kynaston has decided to take a step back from her role as Editor of *North News*. Consequently, this Edition marks the last one on which she will have worked.

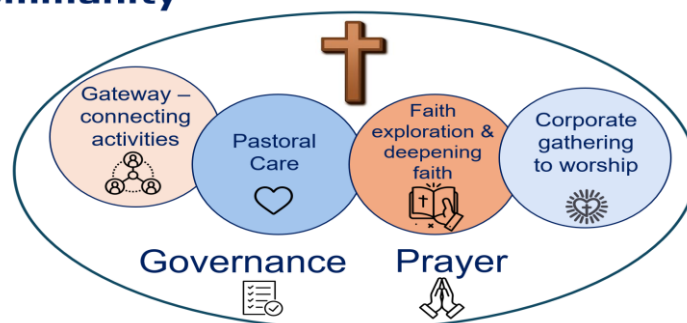
InTogether is excited to be at a stage where, more and more, we are finding opportunities to offer prayer or opportunities to explore the faith that is foundational to everything we do. As relationships with the families have grown, questions have sometimes arisen and volunteers have been able to share their faith or offer to pray for various life situations.

Recently we have offered an Alpha Course and Discovery Bible Studies and one or two parents have responded positively. We have held two Mind Body and Soul retreats offering Pilates, crafts, Christian relaxation/meditation and space where prayers can be said about life's challenges. Over twenty parents have come to each retreat and we have had many ensuing conversations about prayer and its benefits. In May we hope to start a Kintsugi Hope Wellbeing Group which similarly will bridge wellbeing and faith.

We are also delighted to be starting a monthly Outdoor Church in May at Green Shoots Garden at Aberdalgie Church when we will offer an inclusive space for families who have children with additional support needs to explore and experience Christian faith in interactive, fun ways.

Other areas of income for the Church are:

- 1. Trading activities, such as hall lets.
- 2. Charitable activities, such as weddings and funerals.
- 3. The Church of Scotland Investment Trust - Income Fund dividends received.
- 4. Capital monies held by the General Trustees Proceeds of Craigieknowes Manse, Glasgow Road Manse and Church flats.
- 5. Income Fund dividends received via the Consolidated Fabric Fund (Revenue)

Main expenditures during 2025

- 1 Capital Projects- Church and New Hall £99,992
- 2 Ministries and Mission Allocation £109,000 - (Giving to Grow)
- 3 Church staffing costs £34,477
- 4 Heating and lighting (Including 'Open Church' cost £ 7,417) £27,245

**Reserve Funds** – The General Fund (Working Fund) had a deficit of £1,171 which was deducted from the General Reserve Fund. We are budgeting for a 2026 General Fund deficit of £4,107.

At 31 December 2025, the Church held total funds of £672,425 which includes the Manse at 2 Cragganmore, valued at £300,000.

The following categories of funds are held:

Kirk Session Fund £ 9,119

Restricted Funds £120,137

Unrestricted Funds £486,241 (Includes Manse)

Church Organisations £56,928

Totalling £672,425

In addition, funds held on behalf of the congregation by the Church of Scotland Trustees amounts to £142,308 (at cost).

Session approved the Annual Report and Accounts 2025 on 4th March 2026 subject to a successful examination of the records by Morris & Young CA. The Accounts were signed off by Morris & Young CA on week commencing 16th March 2026.

A Copy of the Annual Report 2025 will be sent to the Church of Scotland and to Presbytery for Attestation. After this stage has been approved, OSCR (Scottish Charity Regulator) will be sent a copy of the Report.

Copies of the Annual Report 2025 will be available at the Church Annual Stated Meeting on 26th April 2026 and will also be available to view on the Church website.

A sincere thank you to the Finance Group who support me and to all Congregational Members/Trustees who continue to give towards the financial wellbeing of the Church.

One half of a cross. They handed it to him like it was nothing. Like it could be thrown away; like they were going to throw *him* away; this thing of terrible beauty. The crosspiece which his hands would be nailed to: he carried it.

But first there was a journey to make: from Pilate's palace, through the crowded city streets, to the hill of the skull outside the walls, about half a mile. And all this way he half-carried, half-dragged this great girder, this joist from which he would hang. He was already battered and broken from being flogged and the crowd that had welcomed him days earlier now bayed for blood. And the pallor and expectancy of death was already upon him.

The Romans were fond of crucifixion; they liked its precision. They had used it for thousands of years. The clever bit was the nail through the feet. Death comes slowly! As he carried this weight through the streets Jesus knew what was in store for him.

The carpenter's son from Nazareth – this man stumbling to his death – he is remembered. And of all the things that we remember about his life and teaching, it is this event - his dying - that we remember most. Not just one more notch carved in the endless torment of human misery, but God sharing it, God involved in the world he made. Jesus carried the purposes of God.

## WATER WELL PROJECT

**Thank you**, to everybody that has supported the fund raising towards providing “Care with clean water” by purchasing homemade marmalade, jams, jelly, crumbles, tarts or gingerbread. Thank you also to those who donate the fruit to make the produce or donate money towards the project. This has allowed us to send a cheque for Two Thousand Two Hundred pounds £2,200 to Blythswood Care that has been raised between May 2025 and February 2026.

We were informed that the money sent last year helped to automate a bore hole that Blythswood had funded a few years ago at Magina School for secondary girls. This is in the village of Ayweyo, east of Kisumu in Kenya and allows the school safer access and the ability to provide water for the whole village.
